

Three working groups were convened as part of the 2020 CPSG Annual Meeting:






Assessing to Plan (A2P) training session

Group Management

This working group focused on issues surrounding group-based population management (both *in situ* and *ex situ*) for taxa in which data may be collected and/or management actions conducted only on groups of organisms, rather than on specific individuals. It presented a summary of the Group Management Initiative, a collaborative process involving ~ 50 international population experts across diverse taxa to understand and organize existing tools and processes for group management, with the intent to eventually develop and implement new ones. Species Planning in a Virtual Environment: Think Tank


